HARTFORD BEATS MONROE, 43-17

Big Second Half Gives Gorillas One-Sided Victory Friday Night

The Hartford high school Gorillas added another victory to their list last night by trouncing the Monroe quintet, in the Kirkland high school gym, 42-17. The game was interesting, despite the lop-sided score. The first half ended with the Gorillas leading, 19-10, but Monroe was able to count only seven points in the second period, while the Gorillas added 23.

N. Banter, Hartford forward, was the big scorer of the evening. He sank five field goals and nine free throws for a total of 19 points. Hoffman and LeBrun each scored six points for Monroe.

CONGER BEATS DR. PELTZER

Chicago, Feb. 11.—(UP)—Lack of sleep and generally weakened physical condition was blamed today by Dr. Otto Peltzer, German middle distance champion, for his defeat by Ray Conger, Illinois Athletic Club runner, in a special 1,000-meter race here last night.

The half-hour "grudge" between Peltzer and Ray Dodge, holder of the world record for the 1,000-meter run, apparently was forgotten in praise for Conger.

Although Conger's time, 2:37, was more than 10 seconds slower than Hahn's record, the final sprint between Conger and Peltzer more than made up for any slowness in the race.

Last night's race, the feature of the Illinois Athletic Club games marked Peltzer's second appearance in the United States. He had been expected to win easily from Conger, Ray Dodge and Leo Larribee, of Chicago.

Peltzer, who had taken the lead from Larribee in the sixth and final lap, finished fully six yards behind the sprinting Conger. Dodge followed in third place while Larribee who had held the lead during the second lap, came in fourth. Only four men ran. Conger showed a terrific burst of speed on the final lap to win.

BASS DEFEATED BY CANZONERI

New York, Feb. 11.—(UP)—Tony Candoneri is the first Brooklyn fighter to win the featherweight championship of the world since Terry McGovern.

And right there the resemblance ends. The little Italian is recognized today by all the boxing commissioners and athletic associations as the 120-pound title holder, but this will not convince those who saw his unsatisfactory contest with Benny Bass of Philadelphia in Madison Square Garden last night.

For Tony, while he piled up enough points, following a third round knock down of Bass to justify his being declared the winner at the end of fifteen rounds, failed in every other way to show championship calibre.

At the end, he was weary and wan under the severe body punishment which he was subjected. Canzoneri, successor to the championship which has been vacant since Lou Kid Kaplan left it a couple of seasons ago, can't hit, and can't "take it" any too well in the stomach. Some of the loser's punches were slow, and twice Referee Arthur Donovan stopped the fight to tell Benny, but this was not adequate excuse for Tony's poor showing at the finish.
