The Clothes Shop, owned and operated by W. R. Springer, was located in a one-story building. Both buildings were owned by A. J. Moser and company.

The buildings and contents were fully covered by insurance it was said this afternoon.

Frank C. Foreman and Clinton L. Bierer owned and operated the barbershop. Both were in the shop when the explosion occurred. There were a few customers in the shop at that time, also.

The loss to the barbershop was estimated at \$1,200 and the loss to The Clothes Shop was placed at \$2,500. The damage to The Clothes Shop was due largely to smoke and water.

A brick building adjoining The Clothes Shop aided the firemen in halting the blaze.
