# W. C. ZWICK DIES AT FORT WAYNE

## Former Adams County Man, Member Of Fort Wayne Police Force, Dies

William C. Zwick, 46, a sergeant in the Fort Wayne police force, died at his home 1221 Archer avenue, Fort Wayne, Monday night at 9 o'clock. Sergt. Zwick had been a member of the Fort Wayne police force for 21 years. He suffered a stroke of apoplexy last July, since which time he has been ill. His condition during the past few days had improved somewhat but Monday evening he suffered another stroke, expiring a few minutes later without regaining consciousness. Sergt. Zwick was born in Adams county and had been a resident of Fort Wayne 25 years. His first appointment on the police force was that of a patrolman December 4, 1906. He served as sergeant from January 15, 1915 until January 1922 when he was appointed captain, serving in that capacity for years. His rank was reduced when the city administration changed, but he was shortly promoted to sergeant again, in which rank he was serving when he petitioned for retirement after he became ill. He was pensioned August 27, 1927. He was a member of the Fraternal Order of Police. Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Caroline Zwick; three sons, Walter and Irving, at home, and Benjamin, a student in the College of Engineers, Golden Col. three daughters, Louise, Catherine and Ruth, all at home; mother, Mrs. Wilhelmina Zwick who made her home with her son. The deceased was a cousin of William H. Zwick, of this city. He had several other relatives in this county.
