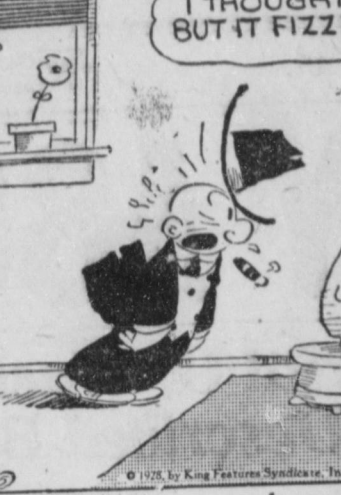

STATE READY TO TAKE OVER EAST AND WEST ROAD

eral aid plan.

The speaker showed, by statistics, that the cost of operating automobiles over unimproved highways was far greater than when the cars are operated over improved roads. In 1926, he said, the people of Indiana had \$438,750,000 invested in motor cars, exclusive of trucks, and it cost the owners \$145,520,000 to operate their cars over improved highways.

Mr. Hershman favors the elimination of the property tax on automobiles and an increase in the license fee, for the purpose of raising more money for road construction. He said that the average automobile license fee in the United States is \$22.58 while the average fee in Indiana is only \$6.41.

The state highway commission plans to build 325 miles of cement roads this year at a cost of about \$28,000 per mile, in addition to main-

taining the stone and gravel roads, he said.

Mr. Hershman advised the local citizens to procure a 70 or 80 foot right-of-way for state roads, instead of the required 60-foot right-of-way, because of the fact that all highways must be made wider in years to come and the cost of procuring the wider right-of-ways after the road is once improved is several times greater.

Mr. Hershman said that good roads boosters in each of the 92 counties of the state think that they have the only honest to goodness road problem in the state and that the highway commission is continually accused of showing preference to other localities in building roads, but he declared that the commission endeavors to distribute the money over the state as nearly even as possible.

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
