refused to return any of it. The three men left the room at the hotel, King going ahead and starting the motor of his car. Just as Madison started to get into the car, Sprague grabbed him and called for the police.

Strangers Are Jailed

Chief Melch responded to the call and took the two alleged swindlers to jail and Sheriff Hollingsworth, also receiving the call for help, followed them to the jail with Sprague and a representative of the hotel.

At the jail, the men at first refused to admit their game, saying that the three were just having a friendly game at the hotel and that Sprague had just had "hard luck."

After questioning, however, King admitted the game and wanted to settle. Madison refused at first to return any of the money, but later realizing the seriousness of the charges that might be brought against them he agreed to return about \$900 to Sprague.

In the meantime, affidavits charging gambling were filed against all three of the participants in the game.

Luggage Is Searched

A search of the luggage carried by the two men, revealed several "loaded" dice and a machine for loading the dice. One of the men also carried a "card harness," with which he could reach to his belt and secure any card he wished for use in the game. He did not have the harness on, however, during the game yesterday.

The men had told Sprague that they just happened to meet in Decatur, but it was later revealed that they were travelling together and had only one automobile. King claimed to be a Detroit cabaret owner and Madison stated he was a "runner."

Both men had registered at the hotel under fictitious names, according to letters and telegrams in their pockets. The automobile title was also in a different name.

All Three Plead Guilty

The two men were lodged in the Adams county jail pending a hearing in mayor's court at 7 o'clock last night. All three appeared before Mayor George Krick last night and entered pleas of guilty to gambling and each was fined \$10 and costs, amounting in each case to \$21.00.

The fines were paid and the money was divided up between the three, Sprague getting about \$900 as his share. The two strangers left this city about 9 o'clock, presumably for Fort Wayne. It is thought that they had been in Fort Wayne previous to their visit to Decatur, as they both had mail addressed to them at the Baites hotel in Fort Wayne.

Two of the young men of this city who had visited the room are known and probably will be questioned today.

Drag Chesapeake Bay For Bodies Of Fliers

Washington, Mar. 1. — (INS) — Convinced that the three navy aviators who became lost while flying Sunday night from Hampton Roads to Annapolis fell into Chesapeake Bay and were drowned, the searching party today was dragging the bay within a five-mile radius of Horn harbor. This is 25 miles north of Hampton Roads.
