FROGS BRING FAME TO TOWN

Parr, Ind., Mar. 6.—(J.P.)—This little
Jasper county town populated by 313
persons, according to the 1920 census,
has hopped into fame on frogs' legs.
Parr is the center of the nation's
frog industry. Shipments are made
by express to Chicago every day, at
times exceeding half a ton a day.
Frog legs have long been high on
the menu of epicures and Indiana
claims the fame of supplying the na-
tion's elite eaters with the "hoppers."
There isn't anything complicated or
exciting about the frog business. A
common garden rake is used to drag
in the frogs from numerous little

streams which abound Jasper county.

'Biggest shippers are Lee Myers,
founder of the local frog industry,
and Len McCurtain. They are ready
at all times to take all the frogs hun-
ters can capture, to meet a steady de-
mand.

Although February, even with its
extra day in 1928, is the years short-
est month, frog shipments from here
exceeded six tons, the exact total be-
ing 12,346 pounds.

New Albany.—Morris Brown, 20,
of Corydon, was killed by electrocution
here while trying to save a house
which had been set afire by charged
wires. Employees of the interstate
public service company were engaged
in blowing out stumps when a charge
brought down a pole, throwing wires
it carried against the house.
