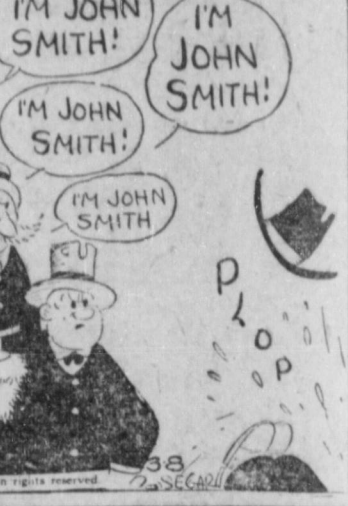

**LEWIS HEARD BY
COAL COMMITTEE**

**Miners' President Says Con-
ditions In Coal Fields
Are Desperate**

Washington, Mar. 8. — (U.P.) — Pres-
ident John L. Lewis of the United
Mine Workers painted for the senate
interstate commerce committee today
a vivid word picture of miners' wives
living a hand-to-mouth existence in
the central competitive field.

"Conditions are so desperate in
West Virginia that these wives stand
at the mine pits waiting for coal cars
to come to the surface so they can
use the husband's credit immediately
at the company stores," he declared.

Lewis was recalled today to answer
committee questions. He testified all
day yesterday when the committee
started delving into conditions in
West Virginia, Ohio and Pennsylv-
ania.

100,000 Chicagoans Pray For Divine Help In Exterminating Crime

Chicago, Mar. 8. — (INS) — More than
100,000 Chicagoans, it was estimated
today, went to special church serv-
ices here yesterday and prayer for
divine assistance in leading the city
"out of the jungle of crime."

The special prayer meetings were
held in several hundred Protestant
churches at the instance of the Chi-
cago Ministers' Association. At each
church citizens were reminded of
their duty at the polls. All were urged
to vote in the April primary and
to pray for guidance in the selection
of their candidates.
