Geneva, March 14.—(Special)—Funeral services were to be held at the Mt. Carmel church this afternoon for Isaac D. One half-sister and a large number of grandchildren and great-grandchildren also survive him. 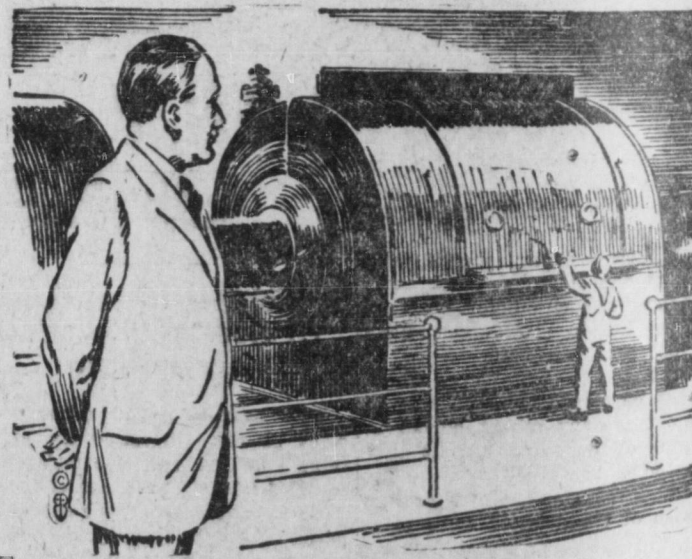
