MAN FREED BY JURY IS STABBED

Excitement Prevails In Alabama Court Room As Verdict Is Read

Columbiana, Ala., March 22.—(INS)—As the words "not guilty" echoed through the court room today, from the jury trying Police Chief H. F. Blake for the murder of Miss Louise Montebaro, Miss Cecil Tubbs, aunt of the dead girl, stabbed the policeman in the neck with a six-inch dirk, and her mother fired a bullet from a pistol that buried itself in the wall above the jury box.

Attorney General Charlie McCall who directed the prosecution of Blake (slighted, and more than thirty spectators who gathered to hear the verdict scampered for the door. The court room was thrown into an uproar as four officers seized the two women and disarmed them.

Chief Blake fell to the floor, blood pouring from the wound in the neck.

Dutch Adventurers In Barrel Shaped Vessel Will Cross Atlantic

London.—(INS)—An attempt to cross the Atlantic in a lifeboat, which is claimed to be unsinkable, is to be made shortly by four Dutchmen.

The lifeboat, which is shaped like a barrel, has a hollow keel that is partly filled with water which will help to counter-balance the trust of wave and wind. The keel is said to be the secret of her stability. It is stoutly built of oak, iron-ribbed and watertight.

The lifeboat has developed a perpetual roll, says the Captain, C. J. Elissen so therefore, she cannot sink. It will carry three compasses and a wireless.

The first lap of the journey from Rotterdam to the Westminister pier, London, took 4 days. It is expected that the journey to America will take forty days or more.

Spain Will Re-enter League Of Nations

Madrid, Mar. 22.—(U.P.)—Spain will re-enter the League of Nations without reservations or conditions, General Primo de Rivera, Spanish dictator, said today in a letter to Jose Urrutia of Columbia, president of the league council, accepting the league's invitation to rejoin.

SPAFFORD PLANS 23-DAY AIR TOUR

Indianapolis, Ind., Mar. 22.—(INS)—E. E. Spafford, national commander of the American Legion, will start a 23-day air tour of fourteen states from Washington, D. C., on March 30, at La Lindbergh, it was announced by national league headquarters here.

The flight will be made in an army plane. The first stop after leaving Washington will be at Pittsburgh, Pa. States to be visited will be Minnesota, South Dakota, Wyoming, Colorado, Utah, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, Montana, North Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas and Oklahoma.

Commander Spafford's air jaunt will be in the interest of the legion's drive for 1,000,000 members. On March 15th the legion passed the 500,000 membership mark.

Celtics Defeat Hoosiers In Championship Series

The New York Celtics defeated the Fort Wayne Hoosiers, 30 to 21 last night, in the first game of the series between the western and eastern division champions of the American Basketball League for the world's championship. The game was played in the North Side high school gym in Fort Wayne. The Celtics piled up a lead of 16-1 early in the game and this advantage was too great for the Hoosiers to overcome. The score at the end of the half was 18-9. Benny Borgeman, star forward of the Hoosiers, went out of the game with a twisted knee eight minutes after the game started. The second game of the series will be played in Fort Wayne tonight.
