ognition to honest doubt. Do not
fear it, it assists faith by challeng-
ing it, and causes all the mental
faculties to rise in defense of what
you believe. A man who has not
fought for his faith against doubt
does not know its value.

"A faith that is handed down or
given to you by someone else is not
worth very much. The faith you
love and value so much that you
would die for it is the kind of faith
that makes character and human
destiny.

In the discussion of his text, Rev.
Dr. Waring called attention to the
fact that St. Paul did not say "I
know why I believe," for that would
be a question of philosophy. Religion
means something more than a mere
philosophical basis. Neither did he
say "I know what I believe" for that
would be a question of theology.
And for your religion to be worth
something to you, it must be founded
on something more than a theological
speculation. You could have all the
theology in the world and not have
religion," he declared.
