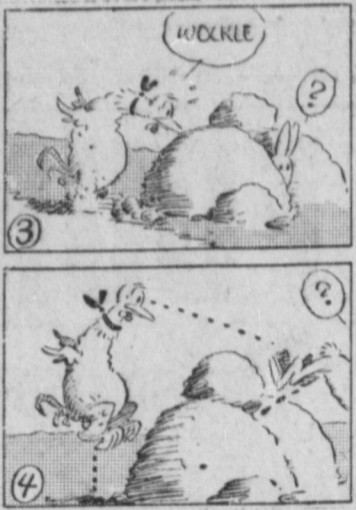

Florida Tuesday and told the 'order takers' in a prepared statement which was widely published that he had annointed Frank Dailey for governor. "He came back, according to an Indianapolis newspaper, tanned with the sunshine of Florida.

"On May 8, I predict, he will be tanned by the independent Democratic voters of Indiana. Indiana Democrats have outgrown the present fiction that their votes may be controlled by the dictum of a one-time meoplistic boss who fondly believes his ultimatum expressed to Democrats should have all the binding force and the supreme court decision.

"In the same breath, Mr. Taggart speaks of Dailey's national background and of his presence in Indiana to push the candidacy of Mr. Evans Woolfen for president.

"Mr. Taggart seeks not only to name the candidate for governor, but also to hostile and deliver the Indiana delegation to the Democratic national convention to be handed over at the opportune moment to some candidate whose name the sage of French Lick has not seen fit to disclose to Indiana's long suffering Democracy.

"Indiana has suffered much during the last six years at the hands of political bosses in the Republican Party, and the Democratic candidates for governor and senator are traversing the state in all directions frantically demanding a new deal from a clean

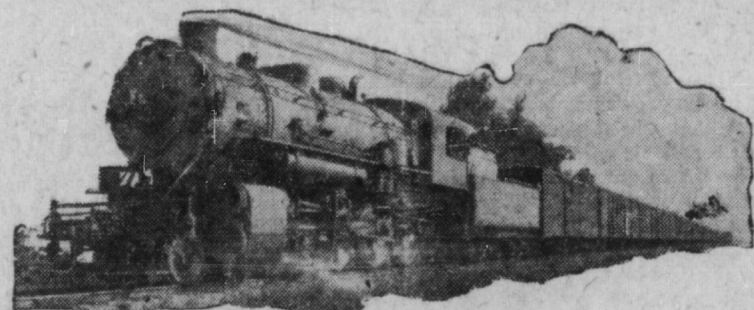

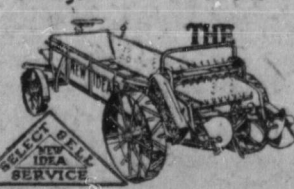
