Indianapolis, Ind., April 4—(INS)—Indiana is outstanding in the manufacture of furniture, William H. Wilson, President of the American Furniture Mart, Chicago, declared in an address before the Indianapolis Rotary Club.

The tonnage of furniture shipped from Indiana is greater than that from any other state in the Union." Wilson asserted. "The Hoosier state stands third in the value of furniture manufactured. It is the birthplace of the kitchen cabinet and the center of that branch of the industry. Queer as it sounds Indiana stands first in the manufacture of cedar chests."

Indiana also has the largest bedroom and dining room furniture factory in this country, ranks third in the manufacture of bed room furniture and fifth in the number of furniture manufacturers, he added.

"Indiana men have contributed largely to the development of the industry" Wilson continued. "Lawrence H. Whiting, of Peru, led in the move to establish the American Furniture Mart, the largest commercial building in world, covering 42 acres of floor space and used by 764 manufacturers to display their products to the retail dealers.

"Indiana has 216 manufacturers and 117 of them take advantage of the Mart for display," Wilson continued.

Hoosiers stand out on the board of control of the gigantic display room Wilson said, six of its 22 members hailing from Indiana. They are J. W. Caswell, Huntington; Lee Endres, Rushville; J. B. Hamilton, Shellyville; Oscar Klammer, Evansville; John Madden, Indianapolis; and Edward Showers, Bloomington.


