## POLICE UNCOVER KIDNAPING PLOT

Chicago, April 9.—(U.P.)—An extensive kidnaping plot in which more than a dozen wealthy Chicagoans were to have been abducted and held for ransom has been revealed by the rescue of Thomas Gaynor and the arrest of seven members of an abduction gang, police announced today.

Police said the kidnapers planned to demand ransom totaling nearly \$1,000,000 from gamblers and others by duplicating the operations carried on by three of their number in Detroit.

Gaynor, wealthy automobile and hotel man, is recovering from the effects of living for two days in a cold, damp cottage near Crystal Lake, Ill., his eyes taped shut. He was threatened with death if the \$100,000 ransom demanded for his release was not paid.

## NOT TO ENFORCE CLEANUP WORK

Frank N. Wallace, state entomologist in charge of corn borer control work in Indiana, gave out the statement Saturday from his office in Auburn that no effort will be made this year to enforce the cleanup work in the 134 infested townships in 15 counties in Indiana.

The decision of Mr. Wallace to abandon the cleanup work this year was made after an unsuccessful effort on the part of men in several states to secure an appropriation from the federal congress with which to pay farmers for their cleanup work.

Last year Indiana farmers in six counties were paid about \$350,000 for their cleanup work.

Mr. Wallace's statement regarding the abandoning of the cleanup work this year is as follows:

"A year ago at the urgency of the federal government, department of agriculture, the Indiana general assembly considered protective measures against the spread of the European corn borer in the state. After a series of conferences the present law was passed by the state legislature with the approval of the United States department of agriculture. The purpose of this law was to furnish the federal government with an arm to secure the cooperation of the states and the farmers.

"Our state appropriations for this work were made with the approval of the federal government and with the understanding on our part at least that federal aid would continue.

"Since the statement was given out at Washington the first of the year that there would be no compensation to farmers for cleanup work this spring a great deal of confusion has resulted in the infested area, especially since the United States department added as a convenient, although not very plausible explanation, the broad hint that the corn borer after all may not be the serious menace which for the purpose of better enforcement had been previously painted to be.

"The state division of entomology, on the contrary, still believes the European corn borer the most serious insect pest that has ever threatened our corn crop, and no evidence was brought out at the agricultural com-

mittee hearing at Washington on March 26 27 and 28 that would minimize the danger of this destructive pest, yet in the face of this the department of agriculture has elected to disrupt an agreement of its own making.

"Under these circumstances, especially because of the discontinuing of federal financial aid, Indiana has not sufficient funds to carry on this work successfully by itself. Such work can only be done through the closest cooperation of all the states and the federal agencies. Under prevailing conditions we should not ask the farmer to make this fight alone, except as a strictly protective measure to himself.

"In the meantime and until the federal government makes up its mind how to do and how to pay for the cleanup work, it would be folly on the part of the division of entomology, department of conservation, to attempt old basis. To carry on complete inspection work our own funds would not be sufficient. We do not feel that we are justified in using money available unless the work can be carried on to successful completion and unless expected results justify certain expenditures.

"Since the United States department of agriculture has turned its back on the corn borer fight, there is nothing left for the state division of entomology, department of conversa-

tion, to do expect to mark time and give such assistance to the farmer as desired and needed, and since the government will not enforce its contract, Indiana therefore feels not justified in enforcing the regulations issued February 10, this year.

"For the time being these regulations are suspended in order to give the farmer the unrestricted control of his own land.

"We reiterate that the lack of federal appropriation and the lack of federal action does in no way reduce the corn borer menace in our state, as corn growers are urged to voluntarily obtain the best cleanup and control of this insect within their means."

**Valparaiso.—(U.P.)**—The Grim Reaper won out over the Stork, 32-31, during the first three months of this year, according to the city Health Board. The quarter ended March 31, showed that there were 32 deaths and 31 births recorded in Valparaiso. Contagious diseases during that time numbered 24.
