## MUNCIE THEATRE

### ROBBED OF \$5,000

Muncie, Ind., April 16.—(U.P.)—While 1,000 patrons watched a movie at the Rivoli theatre here, two masked bandits entered the office of the building and escaped with \$5,000 in cash. The bandits forced Harvey Arlington, manager to hand them the money. They then bound him and locked the door to his office, before fleeing in an automobile.

The \$5,000 represented Sunday's receipts of both the Rivoli and Strand theaters. Arlington is the manager of both shows. The Strand receipts had been brought to him only half hour before the robbery.

Arlington sounded the alarm when, fifteen minutes after being bound, he freed himself from the gag in mouth and an usher heard his shouts.

An automobile was stolen from its parking place near the Rivoli at about the time of the holdup and police believed the bandits escaped in this car.

## INDIANA BOOTS OIL PRODUCTION

Indianapolis, April 16.—(U.P.)—Indiana produced 159,000 barrels of oil during January and February of this year—25,000 barrels more than was produced in the state during the same period of 1927, according to the Geological division of the State Department of Conservation.

The increased production in southwestern Indiana oil fields tended to make up for the weakening production in northwestern fields and was responsible for the increase.

The pool south of Terre Haute on the Vigo-Sullivan county line, in the southwestern producing area, showed a substantial increase during the first two months of this year, over the corresponding period of last year. This section produced 144,000 barrels in January and February, this year, compared with 113,000 for the same amount of time in 1927.

Northeastern Indiana fields, conservation department officials said, are slowly declining in production, although small wells are found occasionally, which end to increase the yield temporarily.

These fields produced only 15,000 barrels for the first two months of this year, as compared with 21,000 barrels last year.

### Hospital Makes Catgut

Catgut for surgical ligatures is being made in a London hospital. The material is spun from intestines of sheep, and must be thoroughly sterilized to make it aseptic and safe for use. Profits from the sale are used to provide more beds and to treat outpatients of the institution.

## 25,000 TEXTILE WORKERS STRIKE

New Bedford, Mass., April 16.—(U.P.)—Protesting a 10 per cent wage reduction, approximately 25,000 New Bedford textile workers went on strike today.

The walk-out, affecting 26 mills, climaxed a fruitless eleventh-hour effort to reach a compromise between the New Bedford cotton manufacturers' association and the New Bedford textile council.

It was estimated the strik would result in a \$600,000 weekly loss of earnings.
