not, and cannot be made, a crime under our constitution," Mr. Gilliom said. "But when it appeared to them and their masters that I was not trying to avoid an indictment for having complied with the physician's request, that I procure a medicine for a desperately ill sister, they nearly broke their necks to avoid it themselves. Though such intolerants are in the minority throughout the state, it is they who have given Indiana an un-American reputation of late," he said.

Dr. H. O. Jones was introduced by Edward E. Leechy, county campaign manager for Gilliom, who in turn presented the distinguished guest of the evening.

A large number of people from Decatur, Monroe, Bluffton, Linn Grove, Geneva and Portland were in attendance.

Mr. Gilliom left Berne immediately for Fort Wayne to catch a train for Evansville, where he is scheduled to give two addresses today.

## OTTO HOLLE

WINS MEDAL

Otto Holle, well-known Union township farmer, has added another medal to his long list of winnings in the production of purebred livestock. Mr. Holle has been a consistent winner in the various clubs conducted by the agricultural agent, cooperating with Purdue University, and this time his success was accomplished in a different project. He has just finished feeding a calf in the Hoosier 1,000-pound calf club, that weighed 932 pounds at one year of age, winning for him a silver medal.

The 1,000-pound calf club is a club that offers a gold medal for anyone who produces a beef calf that weighs 1,000 pounds when one year of age. A silver medal is offered for those weighing from 900 to 1000 pounds and a bronze medal for those weighing from 800 to 900 pounds.

The calf that made this fine record for Mr. Holle is a purebred Shorthorn male. The calf is one of the many purebreds Mr. Holle has on his farm and is a fine specimen of the Short-

horn breed. Mr. Holle states this cow and calf were fed ordinary farm feeds, receiving a grain mixture of corn and oats while on pasture last summer, and silage clover and soybean hay throughout the winter. The calf was allowed to run with the cow until 10 months of age. Some ground oats and corn were also fed during the last two months of the feeding period. Mr. Holle intends to feed several more calves in the 1000-pound calf club for the coming year.
