**Malicious Dog Poisoner Is Sought At Valparaiso**

Valparaiso, Ind., April 18 (INS)—With ten dogs dead today as the result of the operations here of a dog poisoner who is using frankfurters filled with potassium cyanide as his bait, Valparaiso dog lovers were up in arms today and were enlisting the aid of authorities in running down the malicious executioner of their pets.

That the poisoner had some knowl-edge of just what amount of poison to place in the slit frankfurters was plain from the manner in which the dogs died. An overdose of the poison would have had a counteracting effect and recovery would have been pos-sible.

Frater dog owners whose animals were poisoned were examining rec-ords at local drug stores today in an attempt to get a trace of the purchas-er of the poison.

Among those who have lost dogs by the poison route were Attorney Ira C. Tilton, Clarence Beach, who lost three dogs, Charles Lybarger, Glen Baker and Jesse Smith who lost two animals.

Citizens were further aroused by the report that some of the poisoned frankfurters were found in the yard of the Banta school where children ranging from five to eleven years in age enjoy their play hours before and after school.

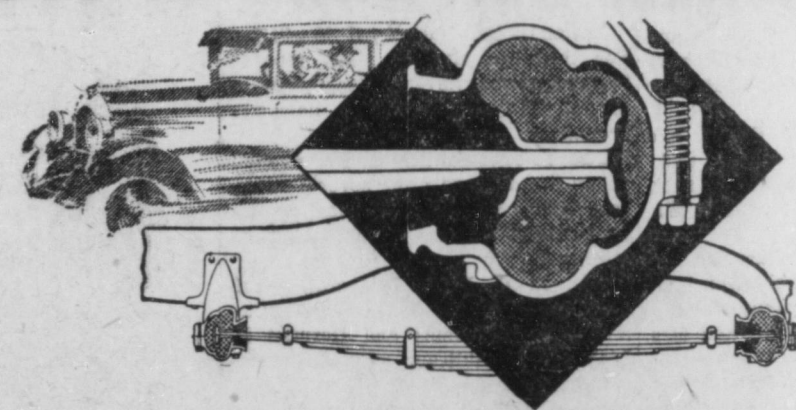
