He is under two jail sentences for his part in the oil scandals and besides he lost millions as a result of the charges against him, so after all he is not getting out as easy as it might appear.

With state primary elections being held now interest in the coming national conventions increases with each week. In the democratic field of seven candidates for governor it continues to look like Dailey against the other six while for the republican honor it looks like Schortemier with a chance for Jewett, Leslie or Adams, though a majority is not likely and the result will depend on the best organization of delegates. For senator Robinson is given the margin by the state writers, with Gilliom second and Carter third on the republican side and Stump and Myers in a "hoss" race for the democrats. The next two weeks may give a "break" to any of the candidates and every body will be watching the finish. Efforts to secure a larger vote than has been usual in Indiana primaries will be made. If you are interested in your government, you ought to vote.

HOW UNITED PRESS
HANDLES THE NEWS

IV

The Washington bureau of the United Press is linked by special telegraph and telephone with congress and the leading government departments. These special wires furnish instantaneous service into the Washington bureau on all news breaks.

For a story like the Teapot Dome investigation, special men keep a "running story" pouring into the main office where it is instantly relayed on the trunk wires.

On some hearings of this nature the telegraph instrument is at the reporter's elbow; but in the Teapot Dome case, a messenger relays the copy from the hearing room to the telegraph room a short distance away.

A "flash" takes precedence over all other matters, and is read, as it comes into the main office, to a trunk operator for distribution throughout the country.

On such stories as a Lindbergh take off, an open telephone is maintained between Holling Field and the Washington staff, thus permitting instantaneous service. Flexibility is stressed on the Washington staff, and a major occurrence finds a sizable group of staff men massed for coverage of that story with subordination temporarily of the routine news stories.
