WOOD TO GET

MADDEN'S POST

Washington, April 28—(INS)—Rep. Will R. Wood (R) of Indiana, will become chairman of the powerful appropriation committee of the house, succeeding Rep. Martin B. Madden (J) of Illinois, whose sudden death yesterday shocked the Capital.

The appropriation committee is considered by legislators the most powerful single committee in either branch of congress, under the budget system installed during the Harding Administration, the appropriations committee exercises a life and death power over all money bills.

The passing of Madden probably means also, it was said the election to congress of a negro. For nearly a quarter of a century Madden represented a south side district in Chicago which is 75 per cent black, and in almost every election he was opposed by one of that race. Only Madden could have retained his grip on the district, his friends believe.

Rep. Wood is serving his seventh term in congress representing the 10th Indiana district. He is 67 years old, and for several years has been chairman of the republican congressional campaign committee.
