Baron Guuther Von Huepfeld, Major Fitzmaurice and Captain Hermann Koehl, heroes of the air, first men to achieve the crossing of the Atlantic from the east to the west, arrived in New York yesterday afternoon but the long expected fliers did not remain long or did they enjoy the reception so elaborately planned. Instead they transferred to a relief plane and hurried on to Washington where they took part in the services which marked the burial of another airman, Floyd Bennett, who died of pneumonia at Quebec while on his way to carry relief to the three foreigners. Tribute was paid to Bennett by the representatives of many nations and the body of the man who had dared and accomplished much was laid to rest by the side of numerous American heroes at Arlington cemetery in the city of Washington.
