Case Venued Here

A suit for \$2,000 damages, filed in the Allen circuit court at Fort Wayne by the Indiana Service Corporation against Fred L. Wecht and William A. Cochran, has been venued to the Adams circuit court for trial. The plaintiff alleges that on Nov. 15, 1926, a bus owned and operated by the plaintiff was badly damaged in a collision with a car driven by defendant, Wecht, at a point on the Lincoln highway, two miles south of Ligonier. It is alleged that Wecht was driving at a high rate of speed and that when he applied his brakes to avoid hitting a car driven onto the highway from a barnyard by defendant Cochran, his car skidded, striking the bus. Attorneys Barrett, Barrett, Peters & McNagney, of Fort Wayne, represent the plaintiff.

Will R. Wood Not To Succeed Madden

Washington May 28—(U.S.)—Representative Will R. Wood, of Indiana, polls, second rank member of the house appropriations committee, will not succeed the late Representative Madden as chairman of the committee, it became known today when representative Anthony of Kansas, who has been ill for several months, returned to Washington and informed house leaders he would be able to serve as chairman of the committee.

VALUES OF FARM PRODUCTS DROP

Indianapolis, May 28—(U.P.)—Indiana was one of ten states showing a slight decrease in the value of farm products for 1927 as compared with totals for 1926 according to a survey made by the Farm Journal, Philadelphia, Pa.

In thirty-one states an increase was registered and seven others equalled in value the 1926 total. For the country as a whole the total values in 1927 were 64 percent greater than for the average pre-war years 1910-14, the survey stated.

Total value to American farmers of their crops and livestock during 1927 was given as \$17,296,000,000. This is approximately \$730,000,000 greater than the 1926 figure.

Indiana's total crop value for 1927 was given as \$249,000,000, which is 98 percent of the 1926 total.

South Dakota led all states in the increased values, with a 43 percent gain, according to the tabulation. Iowa ranks first in total value of farm products with \$1,181,000,000 and in value of livestock with \$15,000,000. Texas takes first place in value of crops with \$772,000,000 and second place in total value of farm products with \$1,117,000,000.

The survey supports the prediction made six months ago by E. A. Meyer, commissioner of the Federal Farm Loan Board, that farm products for 1927 would be nearly a billion dollars more than those of 1926.

Illinois maintained its 1926 total with \$922,000,000; Wisconsin increased 3 percent; Ohio dropped 36 percent and Michigan to 98.
