## Dr. G. B. Oxnam Elected President of DePauw

Greencastle, Ind., June 1.—(U.P.)—Dr. Garfield Bromley Oxnam, professor of homiletics at Boston University, today was expected to accept the presidency of DePauw University.  
Dr. Oxnam was elected by a unanimous vote, by the board of trustees of the university, to succeed Dr. Lemuel Herbert Murlin. The new president's home is in Los Angeles, Calif.  
The trustees were thought to have concurred in a recommendation made by Dr. Murlin, when he presented his resignation last year. Dr. Murlin recommended that the board choose a younger man to fill his position. Dr. Oxnam is less than 40 years of age.

## Geneva Child Injured In Automobile Accident

Geneva, June 1.—(Special)—Little Miss Ada Hendricks, six-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Hendricks, of Geneva, was painfully injured in an automobile wreck Wednesday morning at nine o'clock. An auto driven by negro crashed into the Hendricks car on the east side of Price's bridge, two miles north of Geneva, on the U. S. road No. 27.  
Miss Hendricks had some of her teeth knocked out and received lacerated lips. She was taken to a Berne physician, who dressed her injuries.

"Vanities" Burned  
The "Bontire of Vanities" was the burning of indecent books, pictures, masks and other objects pertaining to frivolity at Florence, Italy, in 1497, under order of Savonarola. A Venetian merchant offered 22,000 gold florins for the doomed vanities, but his offer was rejected and his portrait was added to the pyre. It is said that no book or painting of value was destroyed.

A group of army pursuit planes prepared to leave to greet the trans-Pacific plane as it nears the islands and escort it to Wheeler Field.  
A radio message from the plane said the craft was expected to land here at 10 a.m. (PCT.)  
The navy also detailed a group of planes to join the escort and it was probable that Martin Jensen and Art Goebel, two of the successful contestants in the Dole race last summer, would fly out in the plane Aloha to greet the crew of the Southern Cross.  
Gerald Phipps, British consul, arrived at Wheeler Field early to extend greetings on behalf of the British empire.

Seymour, Ind., June 1.—(U.P.)—Mrs. Nora Kriete today faced a first degree murder indictment returned by the Jackson county grand jury at Brownstown, as the result of the death here May 6 of Ralph Hodapp. She was alleged to have struck Hodapp on the head with a heavy wood stake which had been set to mark a boundary between properties of the Kriete and Hodapp families over which there was a dispute of long standing. Bond was set at \$5,000.

## Jackson Appoints New Industrial Board Member

Indianapolis, Ind., June 1.—(INS)—Governor Ed Jackson staged a shake-up of state officials here today by his failure to reappoint Thomas Riley, who for seven years has been a member of the state industrial board of accounts.

Jackson appointed Horace Yergens of Newcastle to succeed Riley as a democratic board member despite the fact that Riley had indorsements from former United States Senator Thomas Taggart and other powerful democrats.

Lawrence Orr, chief examiner of the board of accounts, explained the ousting of Kimberlin as being "for the good of the service."

Reports were current that Frank T. Singleton, chairman of the public service commission, would not be reappointed and that he would be succeeded by Pliny Wolfard, the governor's secretary.
