# TORNADO KILLS TWO IN KANSAS

## Many Injured When Wind Storm Sweeps Across State At Midnight

Wichita, Kan. June 9.—(NS)—Two are dead, five more are seriously injured and many slightly injured as the result of a tornado which struck near Caldwell, Kansas, last midnight, according to delayed reports reaching here today.

Blue City and Anthony, Kansas, and Little Sandy, Oklahoma, and other small villages within a radius of 30 miles of Caldwell were in the path of the storm which uprooted trees, destroyed telephone and telegraph lines and unroofed several buildings.

The dead are: Mr. and Mrs. Williams who lived at a pumping station near Little Sandy.
