Coroner Returns A Verdict Of Suicide

Kendallville, Ind., July 3.—(INS)—A verdict of suicide due to a self-inflicted gun shot wound in the head was the verdict of coroner Harold Shew following his inquest into the tragic death here of John Marion Isbell, 45, wealthy mortgage and finance broker of Chicago.

Isbell shot himself in the head with a .22 caliber rifle at the country home of J. P. Faux, three miles west of here yesterday. Mrs. Faux found the body. The wounded man was rushed to Lake View hospital here where he died last night without regaining consciousness.

Mail Damaged When Firecracker Explodes; Investigation Begun

Elwood, Ind., July 3.—(U.P.)—Damage to mail which resulted when a firecracker placed in a box exploded today was under investigation by Postal Inspector Hagan, Logansport. None of the mail was burned, but the explosion tore letters and other papers to such an extent addresses were barely legible.

THE CAMPAIGN LOG

(By United Press)

Senator Joseph Robinson, Democratic vice presidential nominee, after clearing up work at his home office in Little Rock will go to Hot Springs, Ark., to rest and await official notification of his nomination.

Herbert Hoover cancelled all political engagements today in order to work on departmental business. Dr. Hubert Work, chairman of the national committee, and Henry J. Allen, publicity manager for the Hoover-Curtis campaign, are expected in Washington Thursday to start active campaign work.

President Coolidge has assured Dr. Hubert Work he will do everything in his power to aid the campaign of Herbert Hoover but has not decided whether to make several eastern speeches.

H. P. Paris, presidential candidate for the prohibition party in 1924, said he believed the prohibition party this year would endorse Herbert Hoover and not make a presidential candidate of its own. It would be the first time in more than 50 years there was not a prohibition candidate.

D. Leigh Colvin, national chairman of the prohibition party, said the party and the anti-saloon league would not work together in the campaign this year.

Governor Smith rested in New York today and conferred with friends preparatory to making two speeches tomorrow—one before the Tammany Society and the other before 15,000 new voters.

Chicago Gets Relief From Intense Heat

Chicago, July 3.—(INS)—Temporary relief from Chicago's first real heat wave of the summer came this morning in the form of cooling showers, but a hot sun broke through the clouds and shot the mercury up, indicating the torrid wave has not yet burnt itself out.

Yesterday's maximum temperature was only 87—at 6 p. m.—but it felt like 97 on account of the humidity. Again the beaches were crowded, many persons remaining there until past the midnight hour when a driving downpour, accompanied by thunder and lightning, sent them home.

Late this evening there should be a repetition of the refreshing showers, according to the forecast bureau.

New Cabinet Assumes Duties In Germany

Berlin, July 3.—(INS)—"Germany is the first nation to agree unconditionally to the proposed American treaty to outlaw war," declared Chancellor Herman Mueller in the Reichstag this afternoon in introducing his new cabinet. He added: "We shall continue to do our share to realize this great plan which places the world's assurances for peace upon the broadest possible basis."

The chancellor said that Germany has relinquished any possible thought of revenge.

Call Issued For National And State Bank Statements

Indianapolis, Ind., July 3.—(INS)—Luther F. Symons, state banking commissioner, today issued a call for the condition of all Indiana state banks as of June 30.

Washington, July 3.—(INS)—The comptroller of currency today issued a call for condition of national banks as of June 30.

Boiler In Bakery Explodes; Man Killed

Kansas City, Mo., July 3.—(U.P.)—One person was killed and four others were injured seriously when a boiler in a bakery exploded here yesterday. Jess F. Culbertson, 46, a janitor, was killed when the explosion blew him 65 feet through two doors and against a basement wall.

Brown County Hamlet, Town Pump And All, Sold

Gaawbone, Ind., July 3.—(U.P.)—This Brown county hamlet, population twenty-two, has been sold by John B. West to Mrs. Jessie Sweeney, Bloomington. The sale includes the town pump, known to thousands of tourists.

CRUISER HITS ROCKS; WRECKED

Halifax N. S., July 3.—(INS)—The British cruiser Dauntless, which struck on Trump Cap Shoals, eight miles east of Halifax late yesterday, probably will be a total loss, according to crews of lifeboats returning early this morning from the Shoals.

The ship struck in the dense fog and was held fast amidship, if a storm comes up, mariners fear she will be swept off into deep water.

Over four hundred of the crew are being brought to Halifax dock yard. Fifty men were still standing by the ship today.

The supply ship Citta Di Milano advised she had been in strong radio communication with the group headed by Lieutenant Vigliani. There was a more hopeful tone to the messages that came out of the Northland.

Vigliani advised the Citta Di Milano's message said, that the flocks were shifting so rapidly that the possibility of an airplane landing soon seemed good. The temperature must lower some, however, before such a landing can be made.

Thirty Injured By Bull

Madrid, July 3.—(INS)—Thirty persons were injured in the poorer quarter of Madrid today when a bull dashed into a crowd while being led to a slaughter house.

Irish Plan Demonstration For Fitzmaurice And Pals

Dublin, July 3.—(INS)—An imposing demonstration was planned here today for Major James Fitzmaurice and his two German companions, who flew over the Atlantic in the plane Bremen. Fitzmaurice, Baron von Huenefeld, and Capt. Hermann Koel reached London from Germany yesterday and were to fly to Dublin today. Fitzmaurice is a member of the free state air force.

79 Mexican Rebels Killed

Mexico City, July 3.—(U.P.)—Federal soldiers killed 79 rebels in four fights of varying severity in Jalisco state, and lost eleven killed themselves, it was announced officially today.

Hoover Tries To Get Back To Work Today

Washington, July 3.—(U.P.)—Herbert C. Hoover, republican presidential nominee, cancelled all political engagements today in order to work on commerce department business.

The annual budget of the department must be submitted to the budget bureau this week and Hoover personally is checking estimated expenditures for his department for the fiscal year 1929.

While Hoover plans to resign his cabinet post within a few weeks he desires to have his desk in perfect order before submitting his resignation to President Coolidge.

Prohibition Party And Anti-Saloon League Not To Cooperate In Campaign

Chicago, July 3.—(U.P.)—Ill feeling has arisen between the national prohibition party and the Anti-Saloon league.

D. Leigh Colvin, national chairman of the party, who is here to prepare for the national convention July 10 and 11, said that the two organizations would not co-operate in battling for the dry cause during the coming election campaign.

"The Anti-Saloon league and the prohibition party will not join for the campaign," Colvin asserted. "The league is not a party; indeed, it is not even a league. It is merely a
