"The Social Service report of the Sorority showed that \$10,427.16 had been expended for charitable purposes during the year by the various chapters. The Sorority, which is philanthropic and non-collegiate, supports a mountain school in the Caney Creek Community at Pippa Pass, Kentucky. A total of \$957.87 was contributed to the school by the national organization during the last year, besides donations of clothing, books, games, etc., which were provided by the individual chapters, 60 children having attended this school.
"The convention will be held next year at West Baden, Indiana, with the Illinois Chapters as hostesses.
"Social activities of the convention included a Pirate Banquet at the Hotel Marion, a trip to Hot Springs, with luncheon at the Arlington Hotel, a City Federation Tea and a dance at the Rainbow Gardens.
"Vera Townsend, Lawrenceville, Illinois, was elected as National Sorority president for the coming year."

County Fair Grounds To Become Golf Course

Rushville, Ind., July 5.—(U.P.)—The Rush county board of commissioners have agreed to having the old fair grounds here converted into a golf course.

The new course, which will take in 25 acres, formerly used as the Rush county fair grounds, is about one and one half miles from the city and promoters believe, will afford a place for local enthusiasts to play their golf instead of having to go to other nearby towns where they have golf courses.

Oliver Cartmel, Halbert Brown, Virgil Moffett and Robert L. Newkirk, local business men are the promoters of the golf course, and have been working to gain membership to the club. Charter members are being charged \$5 in order to obtain finances for the erection of a clubhouse and the working of the ground.
The course has eight holes, the

longest being 450 yards and the shortest 150 yards. Plenty of natural hazards are witnessed on the course as the trees and knolls are thick. The cups and flags are now in position and promoters believe the course will develop into one of the "sportiest" courses in this vicinity.

The sole reason for the golf course here, the business men say, is to create home-town interest and to furnish this city's golfers a place to play instead of having them drive twenty miles to another golf course.
