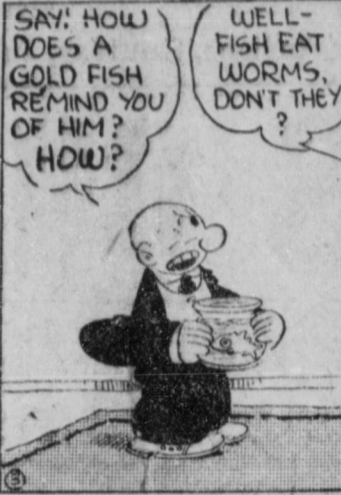

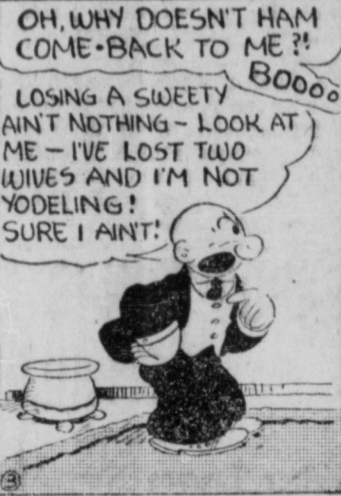
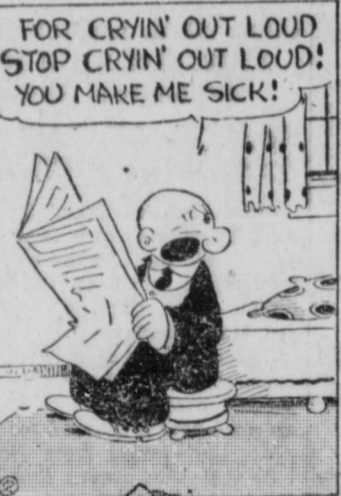

Speculation Regarding Fate
Of Loewenstein Continues

London, July 7.—(U.P.)—Speculation as to the fate of Captain Alfred Loewenstein, who disappeared on a trans-channel flight in his own Fokker plane continued today with varying theories offered.

A tug, chartered by Ronald Drew, returned to Dover today without having found a trace of the body of the Belgian millionaire. Drew, pilot of the Fokker plane, believed he knew just about where Loewenstein was reported to have opened an outer cabin door and walked out of the plane.

The tug searched the channel at the spot and found no traces of the continental financier.

But from Paris came reports that differed either from the suicide or accidental death decisions that had been reached.

The financial reaction from Loewenstein's disappearance, so marked the first day, has changed for the better.
