Mrs. Hoover In Mourning As Train Speeds Westward

Enroute with Hoover train near Ogden, Utah—July 19.—(INS)—Saddened by the death of her father, Mrs. Herbert Hoover was in deep mourning today as she neared the end of the trans-continental journey with the secretary of commerce.
The Republican nominee's wife was doubly dejected because she had failed to be with her father, Charles D. Henry, when he died early Wednesday. She remained in seclusion in an apartment in the Hoover private car. Funeral services for the aged Mr. Henry, who has passed his eighty-fourth birthday, will be held in the chapel of the Stanford University at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Two Hundred Dry Dealers Meet At Asheville, N. C.

Asheville, N. C. July 19.—(U.P.)—The two hundred dry dealers attending Bishop Cannon's dry conference here in a plenary session designed to adopt an ambitious political plan to break the solid south in favor of Herbert Hoover, today adopted formally the name "Conference of Anti-Smith Democrats."

The conference also approved creation of an executive board, to consist of Bishop James Cannon, Methodist of Richmond; Dr. A. J. Barton, Baptist, Atlanta, and two delegates from each of the following states: Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia, Texas, North and South Carolina and Georgia.

Veteran Newspaper Man Dies
Lafayette, Ind., July 19.—(U.P.)—Morris W. Phillips, 74, one of Indiana's oldest newspapermen, died here. Until a year ago he was active in his work, but was compelled by ill health to retire.

WALTHER LEAGUE PICKS FT. WAYNE

Milwaukee, July 19.—Fort Wayne, was chosen for 1929 convention city of the International Lutheran Walther League, winning over Cleveland 503 to 458.

The convention by resolution declared itself in favor of winter conferences as reaching more members than meetings at other times of the year and voted approval of the executive board's action in placing the Arcadia summer camp between Ludington and Manistee, Michigan, under control of the national organization. Until recently it was conducted by a group of districts nearby.

Another resolution approved the camp workers school at Arcadia and urged attendance.

E. J. Gallmeyer of Fort Wayne, Indiana for eight years chairman of the executive board, was elected president of the league last night. He succeeds A. A. Grossman of St. Louis. Other officers elected were: Charles D. Wohlten, Brooklyn N. Y., first vice-president; Edwin Meese, Jr., Oakland, Cal., second vice-president; W. A. Baeppler, Edmonton Alberta, third vice-president and W. R. Gramer, Waco Tex., fourth vice-president.

According to word received here today by Mrs. Mary Holthouse, the condition of Sister M. Aloysia, former superior at the Sister's Home in this city, is much better. Sister Aloysia is located at the St. Agnes' Convent, Fond Du Lac, Wis. She had been seriously ill with an attack of bronchial pneumonia. Her condition is much improved now and those in charge believe that she will be able to resume her duties again within a few days. Sister Aloysia resided in Decatur for many years and her many friends here are glad to learn of her improvement in health.
