## Slayer Of Obregon May Escape Death Penalty

Mexico City, July 25.—(INS)—Possibility that Jose De Leon Toral, slayer of President-elect Alvaro Obregon, may escape death for his deed loomed today.

Leaders of the Obregonista faction believe that Toral was only a tool in the hands of the Laborites. In a public statement they demanded the removal of all Laborite officials from office, saying that members of this minority party had played upon Toral's fanatical religious views in such a way as to bring on the slaying.

## Many Men In U. S. Navy Will Re-enlist

An average of \$4,410 men for the U. S. Navy will be required during the fiscal year 1929. It is expected that of the 19,385 enlistments to expire, 65 per cent will re-enlist. There were 68.5 per cent of the men whose enlistment expired during the 1928 fiscal year re-enlisted, the report shows. The total number of men in the Navy on June 30, 1928 was 84,276.

## 500 Bottles Of Beer Found In Weed Patch

Shelbyville, Ind., July 25.—(U.P.)—Five hundred bottles of beer found in a weed patch on a farm north of here are without an owner. Both the owner and tenant of the farm having disclaimed the beer after seizure by police.

## SMITH TO CONFER WITH GOV. RITCHIE

Albany, N. Y., July 25.—(INS)—Gov. Al Smith announced today that he would leave Albany shortly after noon Friday for New York City, where he will confer with Gov. Ritchie, of Maryland.

It is understood that the two executives will discuss the political situation in Maryland and some of the other border states.

The conference with Gov. Ritchie is regarded as the most important one that Gov. Smith will have with any of the Democratic leaders between now and August 22, the date of his notification ceremony.

## Young Father Drowns But Saves His Baby

South Bend, Ind., July 25.—(INS)—Exhausted in his flight to rescue his baby son Edward Lafontaine, 28, of South Bend, Indiana was drowned in Birch Lake near Cassopolis, Michigan, but his heroism saved his young son's life.

Lafontaine had been rowing with his three year old boy when the boy fell into the water from the boat.

The father dove into the water after the child and kept the boy's head above water until nearby fishermen came to him and took the child. Then Lafontaine sank below the water and failed to reappear.

Divers located and recovered the body about thirty minutes later.
