Muncie, Ind., August 3.—(U.P.)—All

Young Minister Receives
A Threatening Letter

Spencer, Ind., August 3.—(INS)—
County Authorities assisted by citizen
volunteers today were searching for
the writer of a threatening letter re-
ceived by the Rev. Frank Dewey Mc-
Fadden, 29-year-old Baptist minister
who has been a storm center of a
church fight here.

The letter was written on Friday,
July 13, but was not made public by
the authorities to whom it was turned
over until today.

The letter accused the young min-
ister of being a Catholic and ordered
him to be gone from Spencer by Aug-
ust 13 or take the consequences.

Rev. Mr. McFadden said trouble
started in his church here when some
of the older members found out that
they could not run the church to suit
themselves as they did before his ar-
rival. He declared he would fight it out
to a finish.

Richmond-Chinaman To
Bury Body Of White
Wife At Hong Kong

Richmond, Ind., August 3.—(INS)—
The body of Mrs. George Long, former-
ly Miss Irene Hoss, of Decatur, Ill.,
will find its final resting place in Hong
Kong, China among the graves of her
husbands revered oriental ancestors.
Long, an Americanized Chinese pro-
prietor of a laundry here, has been so
broken up by grief over his white
wife's death that he has decided to
sell his business and return to the
land of his fathers.
He will take with him his wife's
body and their four children, who, he
explained, will be consoled by the
presence of their dead mother as they
grow up in China.
