Approaching Florida**

Key West, Fla., August 13.—(U.P.)—
A secondary tropical disturbance
which developed after midnight south
of Key West has passed northward
into the gulf of Mexico near cape Ro-
mano, 70 miles north of here, the wea-
ther bureau reported today.

H. B. Boyers local observer, said the
disturbance was headed in the direc-
tion of Pensacola and Apalachicola on
the north gulf coast.

city of 80 miles an hour was reported
by the steamer.
