Decatur County Officers**

Greensburg, Ind., Aug. 14.—(U.P.)—Authorities here and in surrounding cities said today they were bending every effort toward capture of Otis Moncarde, Louisville, Ky., who at 14 is known as a "bandit gunman."


"Shoot your way out and go with me."

South Bend, Ind., Aug. 14.—(U.P.)—Just as police were about to arrest him in connection with the murder of Mrs. Lillie Carmean, Austin Pavey, 37 year-old musician, committed suicide by shooting himself in the head today.

A few minutes later, police battered down the door of his room and found Pavey dead. His death closed the only avenue by which authorities expected to explain the slaying of Mrs. Carmean.

Mrs. Carmean was shot four times Monday while walking in a busy street.

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**To Probe Shooting Of
Youth By Dry Agents**

New Albany, Ind., Aug. 14—(U.P.)—Investigation of the shooting by federal dry agents Friday which resulted in Clarence Smith, 16, losing his left arm, is to be made here Wednesday by Thomas P. McMaster, Washington county prosecuting attorney, who intends to question the boy at a hospital here.

The prosecutor will interview Charles R. Liebert, the agent who shot young Smith, and announced that if information he obtains warrants, he will submit the case to the Washington county grand jury when it convenes in September.
