"Shoot your way out and go with me."

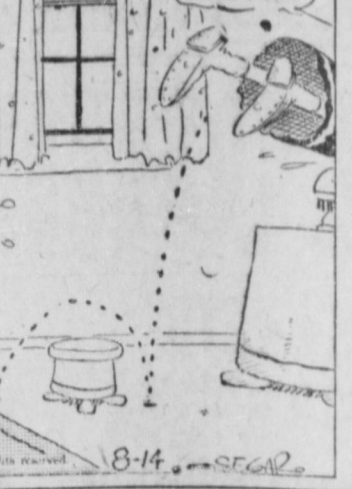
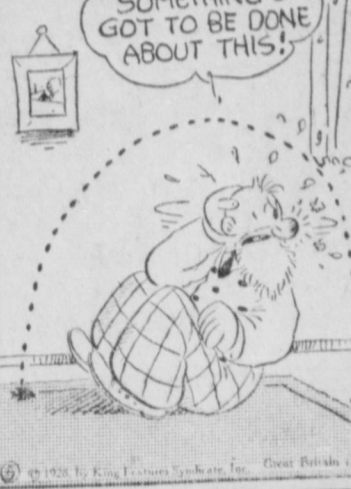
The other boys did not follow the advice, and Moncarde returned to a window in the jail and compelled them to return the revolver and saws, remarking:

## THE CAMPAIGN LOG

By United Press Leigh Colvin, national chairman of the prohibition party, probably will recommend that his party endorse Herbert Hoover instead of entering a separate ticket in each state.

Senator Norris, Nebraska, said the Hoover acceptance speech was "disappointing and unsatisfactory" and indicated he might oppose the election of the Republican nominee.

Former Senator Moses E. Clapp of Minnesota, Republican, announced he would join the Smith independent party and work for the Democratic candidate in the corn belt.

Wayne Williams, Democrat and former attorney general of Colorado, announced he would not support Governor Smith because of the New Yorker's prohibition stand.

## Flier Lands Plane

After Motor Drops Out Kokomo, Ind., Aug. 14.—(U.P.)—Landing a plane after the motor dropped from it, 1,900 feet high, was the feat of Martin Young, Gary, the accident having occurred shortly after he took off from Shockley field here in a monoplane with his mechanic, M. M. French.

Near Russiaville, a connecting rod on the five cylinder motor broke, knocking off one cylinder. Young prepared to bring the plane down, but the motor literally came to pieces, leaving only the carburetor and part of the crankcase.

Although the plane's tail was inclined to bring the machine down backwards due to the lightning of the weight at the front through loss of the motor, Young managed to land safely in a cornfield.
