Although Raskob claimed all of the above states should the election be held now, reports presented by national committeemen from some of the middle-western states made it clear that most if not all of the agricultural region is battle ground for the democrats, Raskob believes, however, that the "farm revolt" is of far greater proportions than most observers realize. This is the impression received, he said, from his talks with leaders from Minnesota, Nebraska, Iowa, the Dakotas, Montana and Kansas.
