CITY SCHOOLS SHOW GAINS IN ENROLLMENTS (CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE)

415 today. There were 45 beginners in the first grade which is an increase over last year. The other seven grades had an enrollment of 325. In the high school, there were 90 students, which number is also larger than that of a year ago.

Classes were being organized today and few cases were reported where the pupil could not start school today. It is expected that several more pupils will enroll this week.

The enrollment in the school is the largest in the history of the local Catholic school. Last year, the enrollment totaled 399. The first and second grade classes have been moved into the large rooms on the first floor and the northwest and northeast corners of the building. Sister M. Sophia, is the teacher in the first grade this year.

The eight new Sister teachers who were assigned here arrived last week and were busy today organizing their classes and fixing class periods. Sister M. Vera is the principal of the school this year, succeeding Sister M. Roberta, who was given the principal of the Catholic school at Unionport, N. Y.

COUNCIL FIXES NEW RATE SAME AS PRESENT LEVY

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE) as advertised. The rates fixed on the hundred dollars for these levies are: Union .67; Root .48; Preble .55; Kirkland .55; Washington .39; St. Marys .49; Blue Creek .71; Monroe .59; French .62; Hartford .62; Washash, .59; Jefferson .69.

All of the county councilmen attended the meeting today and will return tomorrow to sign the ordinance. No changes were made in the appropriations, the figures remaining the same as advertised, the reductions coming in credits in the different funds and by adding the ten per cent to the valuations. The general fund is lower than a year ago.
