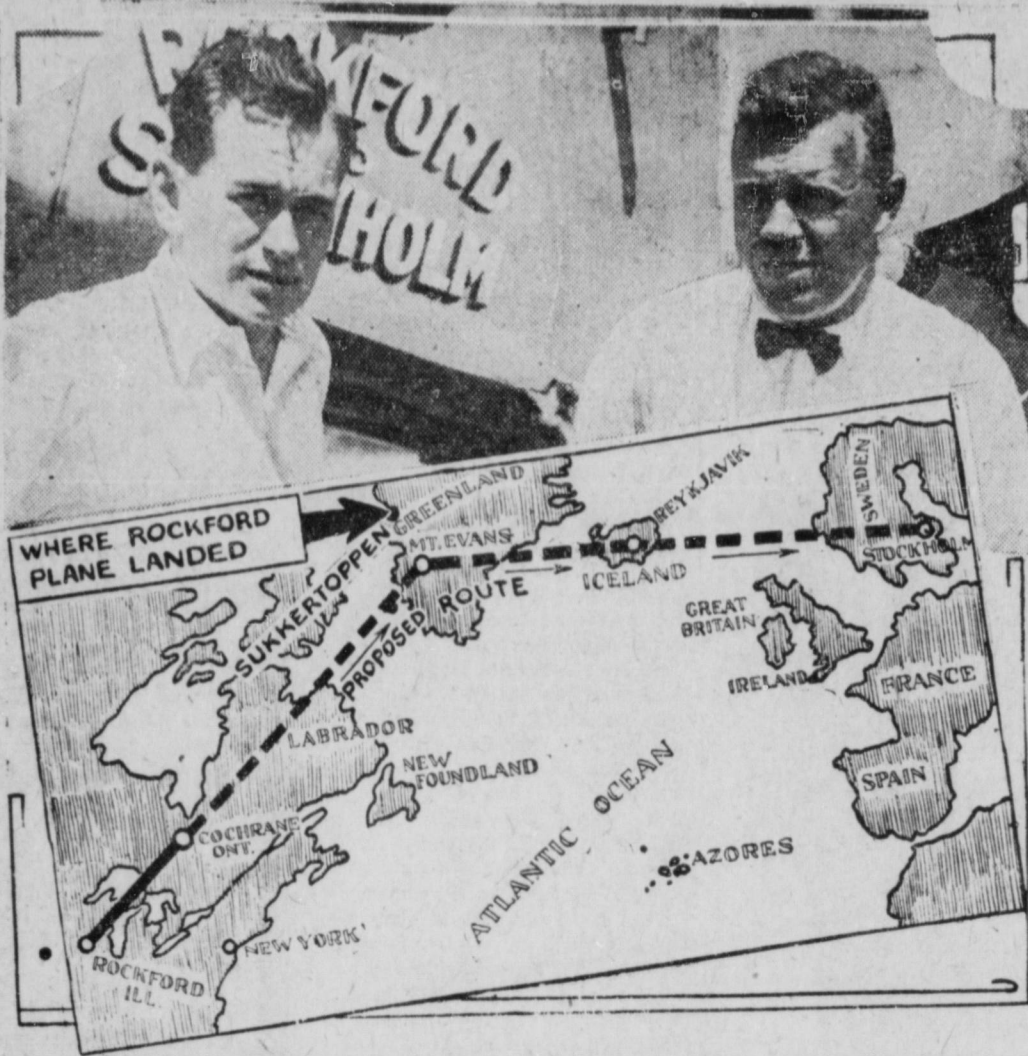


## COW TESTER MAKES REPORT

Dairy herds in the Adams County Cow Testing Association held up well during the month of August, despite the fact that pastures were short and a large number of cows were dry. An interesting note to all dairymen in Adams county is the fact that "Maxine," high cow in all the cow testing associations in the state last year, dropped a fine heifer calf about two weeks ago. D. J. Macelin, her owner, has refused some very flattering offers for this fine young animal. A. Z. Smith, of Washington township, a member of the association, installed a new milking machine during the month.

There were 249 cows tested during the month by tester, R. L. Price. Herd owners reported 51 dry cows, 5 new cows were entered. The boarders were disposed of and 3 owners are keeping daily milk records. The average production of the ten high cows in the association during the month was 1,225 pounds of milk and 44.8 pounds of butterfat. Rudolph Steury owned the high cow for the month, a grade Holstein which gave 1,606 pounds of milk and 54.6 pounds of butterfat. The production of the five high herds for the month is as follows: P. D. Schwartz, Holsteins, average of 1,096 pounds of milk and 34.5 pounds butterfat per cow; John J. Schwartz Grade Holsteins, average of 947 pounds of milk and 32.5 pounds of butterfat per cow. Eli Stucky, Grade Jerseys, average of 653 pounds of milk and 32 pounds of butterfat per cow; Dennis Striker, Grade Holsteins, average of 913 pounds of milk and 31.7 pounds of butterfat per cow. M. P. Steury, Grade Holsteins, average of 924 pounds of milk and 29.8 pounds of butterfat per cow.
