



D. H. S. TO OPEN SEASON SEPT. 15

Decatur high school's Yellow Jackets will open their football season on their home gridiron, a week from next Saturday, on Sept. 15, when the Auburn high school eleven invades the city. This game was originally scheduled to be played in Auburn, but it was changed to this city, so as to be a feature of Old Home Week, when many former Yellow Jackets will be visiting here. The game will be played on the new gridiron at the County Club, south of the city.

The Yellow Jackets have been working diligently for the last ten days under the direction of Coaches Kidd and Curtis and are beginning to show the effects of the training. Most of the time so far has been spent in learning fundamentals. Following a light workout this evening, the coaches will send the players through stiff scrimmages and signal practice for the next few days. The players have been taught the correct methods to charge, block, tackle, punt, pass and fall on the ball.

The prospects for a strong team are becoming brighter each day. There is considerable weight on the squad this year and several veterans are out for positions. Carl Gerber, who has performed at end for two seasons, has been shifted to the full back position this fall, to add weight and strength to the backfield and he is showing up well in his new position.

The candidates have been divided into two squads by the coaches. The first squad is composed of the following players: centers—R. Kiess and Williams; guards—R. Kiess, Musser, Hillyard, R.
