

## SURVEY SHOWS THAT GIRLS SAVE MORE THAN MEN

Spokane, Wash.,—(U.P.)—Its the man who pays and pays—and you can take the word of Spokane bankers for that.

An investigation into the credit of young men and women of Spokane brought out the fact that the average working girl saves more than the average young man who earns 25 per cent more money.

"A girl with a monthly salary of \$35 per month is able to save more than the average boy whose monthly income is \$100," M. M. MacLeod, of the Spokane's Credit Men's rating bureau, said.

"However, it doesn't seem fair," explained MacLeod. "when in this modern age the woman is placed on an equal basis with man, and she still expects man to do the providing while she received her salary and puts it away for the future."

The investigation brought out the fact that whereas many young men are required to contribute to the support of the family, women usually are not expected to do more than support themselves. Some of them have a difficult time doing that, but in the end, the report revealed, the woman has the money and the man is still paying.

## INDIA IS CALLED GREAT SOURCE OF PRINT PAPER

New Orleans.—The Bamboo forests of India will soon take their places as the leading source of print paper used by American newspapers and at a price considerably lower than that now paid for this article, according to the prediction of Mahesh P. Bhargava, paper technologist of the Forest Research Institute of the British government at Dehra Dun, India, here recently on a tour of inspection of American lumber and pulpwood factories. Bhargava, a graduate of Allahabad University of India and of the College of Technology of Manchester, England, has already visited numerous plants and expected to see all the principal industries before departing

for his native land. In speaking of bamboo as a raw material for the paper-making, Bhargava said the process of converting it into the finished product heretofore was found too expensive to make the work of great commercial value. Research and the improvement of machinery, however, have made great strides in simplifying and cheapening this process, and before many years India's millions of acres of bamboo will be thrown open as an inexhaustible source of supply for the world's pa-

per requirements. The growth of bamboo is remarkable, the Indian pointed out. It requires but twelve months for a bamboo growth to reach the height of a hundred feet or more, Bhargava said, whereas thirty to forty years are required for a tree to reach a growth to make it suitable for pulp usage. Another advantage of the bamboo is the fact that no artificial means are needed to grow it. It will continue to thrive irrespective of cutting. Bhargava is seeking capital to in-

vest in paper making mills in his country. He said his government was prepared to offer alluring concessions to such investors in order to market the country's vast sources of raw material.

## U. S. Mail Planes Fly Distance Around World Every Day Of The Year

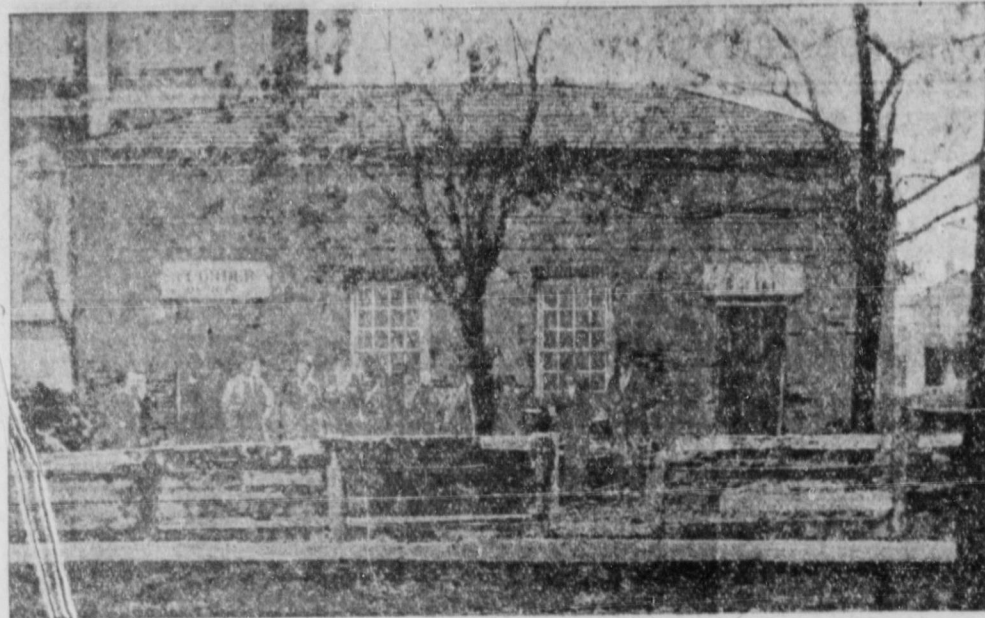
Chicago.—(INS)—The modern mail plane is produced in fleets, which are

necessary to maintain the average speed of 100 miles an hour on the great network over which the planes fly daily a mileage greater than the distance around the world, at the equator, the American Air Transport

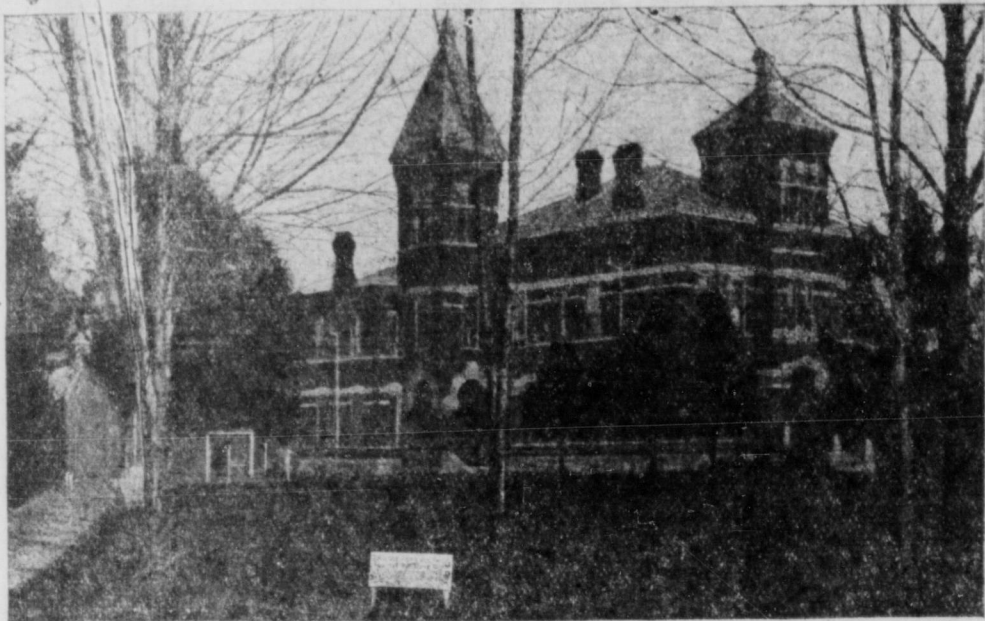
