## GOV. SMITH ON WAY TO OMAHA

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE)  
The New York governor was sleeping as the train crossed into Ohio and he relinquished the dual role of governor and Democratic candidate. Today he became first and foremost the candidate.

Governor Smith slept late, recuperating from the strain of his last day in Albany, when he personally supervised the packing for his tour. He had an arduous physical task, too, in getting through the crowds of Albany citizens which packed the station to wish him farewell and good luck.

Smith manifested keen interest in the train which is the most luxurious and elaborately equipped of any ever ridden by a presidential candidate. After it got under way, he went through its whole length, shaking hands with many of the 40 newspapermen aboard.

The train's first scheduled stop is for an hour at Chicago tonight to change to another route. A quiet welcome has been planned there, though the train will be in the yards.

away from the center of the city. The train is scheduled to reach Omaha at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday.

From Omaha the governor will proceed southward to Oklahoma City for a speech Thursday night. Then he will turn northward toward Denver where he will speak Saturday night.

The following week he will make addresses at Helena, Montana, St. Paul and Milwaukee, before turning eastward for Rochester, where he will address the state Democratic convention on October 10. From Rochester, the governor will return to Albany for a few days before starting on the second leg of his campaign.

Russel Miller, of Bryan, Ohio, a concession man here during Old Home Week, sustained a painful injury, Sunday, while assisting in dissembling the ferris wheel. A huge motor fell on Mr. Miller's left hand, crushing the second finger so severely that amputation was necessary. He is a patient at the Adams County Memorial hospital, where the operation was performed.

It is hereby ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Berne that there is hereby granted to Indiana Service Corporation, its successors and assigns, the right permission and authority to construct, use, operate, maintain, replace and repair poles, posts, wires, cables, cross arms, guy wires, guy stubs, anchors and any fixtures and appurtenances necessary or proper for the transmission of electricity on, along, over, across and above all of the public streets, alleys and highways in said town of Berne, together with the right to cut and trim such trees as may reasonably be necessary for the construction, use, operation, maintenance, replacement and repair of such transmission lines.

"Section 2. Said franchise is granted upon the express condition that Indiana Service Corporation, its successors and assigns, shall protect, indemnify and save harmless said town of Berne from any and all loss, cost, damage and expense caused by the construction, use, operation, maintenance, replacement and repair of such transmission lines or any part thereof.

"Section 3. This ordinance shall be accepted in writing by Indiana Service Corporation within thirty days from the date of its passage.

## Jesse James, Jr., Tries Suicide In Albion Jail

Kendallville, Sept. 17.—(U.P.)—Jesse James, Jr., of Los Angeles, Cal., who claims to be the grandson of the notorious Jesse James of reconstruction days, and who is in the county jail at Albion, charged with grand larceny, attempted suicide, it was learned today. Spurned by a letter from his sweetheart in Chicago, James, apparently meditating over his misfortune of recent days, decided to end it all. He drank a quantity of disinfectant used to spray the jail walls.

Since being incarcerated in the county jail for stealing an automobile, money and other valuables at the James McClure garage five miles west of here on the Toledo-Chicago pike, James wrote a letter to his sweetheart in Chicago. The answer was not at all favorable to his long hours spent in jail. Several hours after delivering the letter to young James, Sheriff John Singleton was summoned to the jail cell. The dapper young desperado was lying on his back on the cement floor, foaming at the mouth and giving every indication of being deathly ill.
