Indianapolis, Sept. 26.—(U.P.)—The federal grand jury today continued its investigation of an alleged interstate auto theft ring while the county grand jury continued its quiz of the \$100,000 Traugott clothing store explosion of August 26.

The federal grand jury was understood to be about ready to return another partial report today and may complete its examination of witnesses in the alleged theft ring late today or tomorrow.

It was considered unlikely that the jury will complete the theft ring inquiry this session.

Makes Charges Against Curtis
Baltimore, Md., Sept. 26.—(U.P.)—
James J. McGrath, attorney, came
into the national presidential cam-
paign today as the man who said he
took a drink with Senator Curtis,
Herbert Hoover's running mate.

McGrath said Robert B. Ennis,
Democratic leader, took a drink at
the same time. Ennis denied get-
ting the drink from Senator Curtis.

Senator Bruce, who told of Curtis
having a generous hip flask at the
Pimlico race track, explained the
story had come to him from a man
who had a drink from the flask.

McGath, who, in a written state-
ment sustained Bruce, was called a
"wilful, malicious and deliberate
liar" when Curtis was shown the
statement at Omaha last night.

Bruce attacked Curtis at the same
time he charged Herbert Hoover
with drinking.

McGrath has one more witness,
John Gray of Brooklyn, N. Y., not
yet found. McGrath refused today
to give Gray's Brooklyn address or
to aid reporters in an effort to inter-
view Gray.

McGrath stands firmly by his
story, however, and has submitted to
Senator Bruce a written statement
saying the incident occurred in No-
vember 1927.

Curtis Denies Charge
Omaha, Neb., Sept. 26.—(U.P.)—"I
dislike to say anything harsh about
a man but if this Mr. McGrath issued
that statement about me he is a wil-
ful, malicious and deliberate liar,"
Senator Charles Curtis, Republican
vice presidential candidate, said here.

"I never offered this Mr. McGrath
or any other person any whiskey at
Pimlico race track or at any other
place. I am surprised that Senator
Bruce should peddle such slander."
