**Members Of State Tax
Board Want Pay Boosted
For Trimming Budgets**

Indianapolis, Nov. 10.—(U.P.)—Members of the state tax board, who spend much of their time trimming budgets of various local communities, have asked for an increase in their own.

Filing their budget request with the board of accounts they ask \$125,550 for the next two years as compared with present appropriations of \$120,247.63.

Salary increases of \$1,500 annually are asked for each of the three commissioners, John J. Brown, William A. Hough and Phil Zoercher. A \$600 salary increase is requested for Schuyler C. Mower, inheritance tax administrator.

**Vestal Re-elected By
A Majority Of 17,055**

Complete returns from Tuesday's election show that Congressman Albert H. Vestal, of Anderson, was re-elected in the eighth district by a majority of more than 17,000, over his Democratic opponent, Don C. Ward of Union City.

Most of the majority Congressman Vestal, owes to the heavy vote in Delaware county and Madison county. His majority in Delaware reached 8,082. He carried his home county of Madison by 8,541, and also carried the county of Ward, Randolph, by 2,707. Ward carried Adams, Jay and Wells counties. His majority in Adams county was 1,473; Wells 603 and Jay, 197.
