

CHINESE KILLED IN SHIP RAID

Scores Reported To Have
Drowned As Pirates
Rob Hsin Chi

Shanghai, Nov. 13.—(U.P.)—Scores of Chinese passengers were killed by drowning and otherwise when the British steamer Hsin Chi was looted by pirates while aground of Tai Island, near Foochow, advises received here today.

The Hsin Chi carried 900 Chinese and a small number of foreigners, including several Anglo-Americans. All the foreigners arrived safely at Shanghai today.

Sailing in small craft, the pirates surrounded the steamer. Part of the passengers and crew had been landed by Captain Tollefsen when the Hsin Chi went aground and they were reported to have been menaced by hostile islanders while the pirates attacked the ship from the sea.

A Chinese gunboat arrived to save the remaining passengers but the pirates had looted the ship and the gunboat stood by while they set fire to the vessel and made off.

The foreign passengers included H. A. Yowell, of the American Foreign Insurance Assn.; Wade Crawford Barclay, Methodist mission education board; Mrs. Alice Hubbard, widow of the former harbor master at Foochow, and Miss A. Todd, of the Methodist mission.

The foreigners were brought to Shanghai by the Dutch steamer Tjitaroom, which had stood by the Hsin Chi after she was beached.

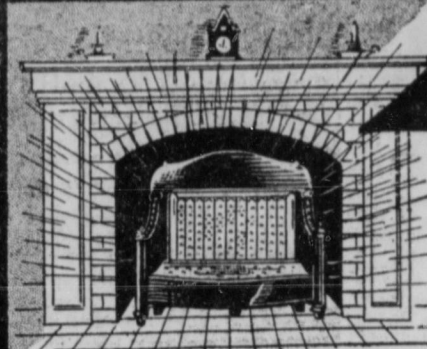
