LABOR FORMS NEW PROGRAM

Union Executives Outline New Policy For State Legislature

Indianapolis, Nov. 15.—(U.P.)—Organized labor of Indiana today was committed to a legislative program outlined at a conference of union executive embracing these objects: Elimination of injunctions in labor disputes. Rewriting of the Workmen's compensation law to increase maximum compensation from \$18.50 to \$18 weekly, increasing total settlement from a maximum of \$5,000 to \$6,500 and extending the provision for medical treatment from sixty days to the life of the injury. Opposition to modification of the primary law. Elimination of the products of prison labor from competition with the products of free labor. Establishment of free textbooks in the public schools. Opposition to the proposed additional appropriation for \$276,000 for state motor force. Names on the legislative committee to draft bills advocated were: Thomas N. Taylor, president, and Edward Barry and Adolph J. Fritz, of the State Federation of Labor; Harvey Cartwright, William Mitch and James Terry, representing the United Mine Workers, district No. 11; and Herbert France, representing the State Bankers' Association. Others are to be appointed, it was said.

to Hoover's assistant, George Akerson. Additional stops may be decided upon while enroute, he explained. Hoover discussed the trip in detail yesterday with Captain Victor A. Kimberley, who will command the Maryland and who came to the Hoover home on San Juan Hill armed with maps and charts. The president-elect is enthusiastic over this venture. He studies maps with keen delight. He knows much already of South America from his study of its problems as secretary of

Commerce, but looking forward eagerly to his visit to the only continent he never has seen in his world travels.

In the next three days he will have instructions with William J. Donovan who is a house guest, regarding matters that may arise during his absence.

Henry P. Fletcher, ambassador to Italy, who will accompany Hoover on this trip as official representative of President Coolidge will not come here, but will join the party at San Pedro. The Maryland will sail as soon as the party gets aboard Monday morning.
