U. HARRIERS TO MEET OHIO

Bloomington, Ind., Nov. 15.—Indiana University's undefeated cross-country team, led by Capt. Fields, Leas and Clapham, will entertain the strong Ohio State University "hill-and-dalers" also undefeated and holders of the National Junior A. A. team championship, here Saturday. The Crimson harriers, coached by E. C. Haynes, have defeated Northwestern, Notre Dame, and Purdue in dual meets, and Wisconsin conference champions; Northwestern and Michigan in the annual quad-rangular race.

Last Saturday, Indiana's three leaders, who have finished no lower than fourth place this year, ran first second and fourth against Notre Dame at South Bend, with John Brown, of Notre Dame, taking third place. Fields, captain of the Hoosier squad for the second year, broke the Notre Dame course record, with Leas, the flashy Crimson sophomore, right at his elbow. Clapham finished fourth.

Outstanding among the Ohio State harriers are Lyman Baker and Gregory Wotschak, who finished high in the Scarlet and Gray won the title. Other Buckeye runners are Western, Hertz, Donnell and Woorhle. The Buckeyes apparently have no outstanding men, relying on high places to win the meet rather than attempting to win individual honors.

The meet, to be run over the Indiana course, will be a part of the annual Dads' Day program at the state school and will precede the Northwestern-Indiana football game.

It will be the final race before the Conference meet, and the Hoosiers hope to make a clean sweep of the season's schedule.

DEMPSEY MAY RE-ENTER RING

New York, Nov. 15.—(U.P.)—Jack Dempsey may meet Paulino Uzcudun or Jack Sharkey in a bout at Yankee stadium next summer and the announcement of the former heavyweight champion's return to the ring probably will be made after a conference with Tex Rickard at Miami Beach, Fla., in January.

Those are the paramount points which fight fans are taking for granted today after three days of conferences between Dempsey and Rickard. "We have arranged for Dempsey to visit my place in Miami Beach," Rickard said after the last conference, "and shortly after his arrival I expect to be in a position to say whether Dempsey will attempt another comeback. There is no secret about the matter now. He doesn't know his own mind yet and there is still plenty of time for him to make it up one way or another."

Although everything points to Dempsey coming back again, the thing that is troubling both Rickard and Dempsey is that neither of them is

sure the former champion can get himself back into shape.

Dempsey is 33 and began fighting in 1915. He has fought only three times since he knocked out Luis Firpo in 1923, the two 10 round bouts with Tunney and his bout with Sharkey. Dempsey is over-weight and out of shape now. He admits it himself.

A strong indication that Dempsey plans to enter training soon is provided by the fact that Gus Wilson, his former camp attendant, has ar-

ranged to close his Orangeburg, N. Y., training camp for the winter as a step toward rejoining Dempsey.
