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### Paris Places Black Hat at Head As Well As On It

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—(U.P.)—The Parisienne is not given to rushing the season. It frequently therefore happens that a Paris conceived idea may be launched on its native heath after it has had a triumphal debut in America. Our correspondent says that—

The Parisienne is only just now thinking seriously about her new winter finery and, for those who are interested, it might be well to know her choice with reference to the first hats she is selecting at some of the leading Paris salons. There is a tendency at the beginning of this season to choose much of felt, particularly a reversible felt, plain on one side and taupe on the other, that is being used on both the right and reverse sides in a clever arrangement that emphasizes its double aspect.

There is also much talk about the velvet turban, but it is necessary to wait a little while in order really to know what future the Parisienne will afford it.

Incidentally the velvet used for these is supplied with a deep gloss, hair of artificial silk, and a changeable effect produced by a weaving in two tones or two colors.

One felt of interest is to be found at Gaby Monro's. It is called feutre marabout, has a downy aspect, and is trimmed by a simple effect of shaved sections. Here one only hears of velvet as encrustations for felt.

From the first hats chosen at Le Monnier one can conclude that felt is still extremely well thought of. As for velvet, it is particularly used as applications for felt, and forms the designs for stylized flowers, or geometric motifs.
