Michigan City Borrows Funds To Pay Employees

Michigan City, Ind., Nov. 27.—(U.P.)—Michigan City, operating under the city manager commission form of government, is without funds to pay its policemen, firemen and other employees and to meet other current expenditures.

The city commission adopted an ordinance last night authorizing the borrowing of \$50,000 and the issuance of time warrants for that amount.

To Ask Revision Of Tariff At Special Session

Washington, Nov. 27.—(U.P.)—Agitation for a special session of congress next March to revise the tariff law was started today by Rep. John Q. Tilson, Con., Republican leader of the House.

Tilson said in a statement he believed revision is necessary to protect agriculture, manufacturing, mining, and other industries.

Chairman Hawley, of the house ways and means committee speaker Nicholas Longworth, Rep. Snell, N. Y. and others met to discuss whether tariff should be taken up at the regular session opening next Tuesday or be held over for a special session.

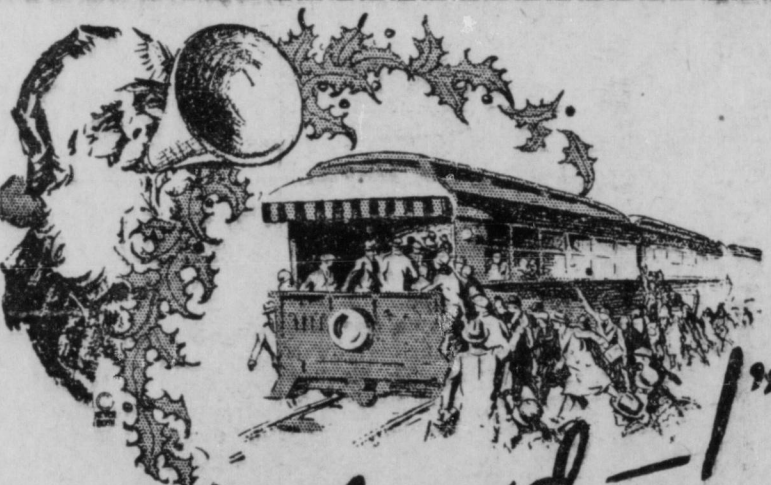
