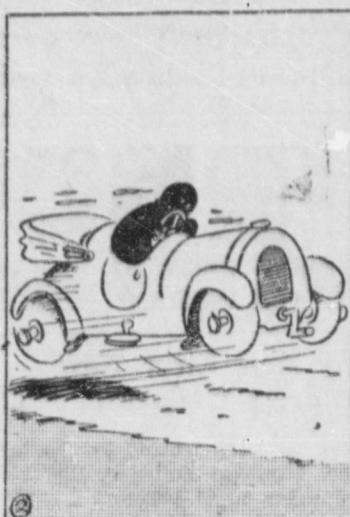

fessor A. T. Wiancko of Purdue University has served on this committee since the first show.

Of equal interest to the members of the Indiana Corn Growers' Association is the State Corn Show to be held at Lafayette January 14-18. \$600 in premiums as well as special medals and cups are offered to winners in the corn soybean and small grain classes, and competition for honors is as strong in this show as at the International. A Junior Corn Show with \$50 premium money is also conducted for the Junior Corn Club members. Lowell Moffitt of Rush County was winner of last year's Senior Show and Kenneth Stillabower of Bartholomew won the Boys Show.

At least 600 entries are expected in the State Show. While corn from the corn borer infested area is barred from the International, arrangements have been made through cooperation with Frank Wallace, State Entomologist, for treating corn for the State Show to kill any borers, but the germination of the corn will not be injured.

Miss Mary Madeline Dowling, of Fort Wayne, is a guest of Miss Ruth Vogelwede at the C. J. Vogelwede home.

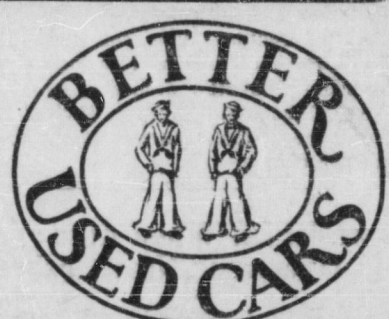
