



YELLOW JACKETS WIN FROM AUBURN

Staging a great comeback, the Decatur high school Yellow Jackets made it a happy Thanksgiving for Decatur basketball fans at the expense of Auburn high school Wednesday night, at the Decatur high school gymnasium. The final score was 41-21, but that doesn't tell much of the story. The game was close until the closing minutes of the second half, when the Curtsens started a bombardment of the Decatur basket which netted a 20-point win.

Things started off pretty even, with both teams fighting hard for an advantage. Coach Curtis chose to start pick and John Engle at the forward positions; Gerber at center, and Krick and Reynolds, guards.

Both teams were stressing defense during the opening half. Decatur hit the net for four fielders during the initial stanza and Auburn managed to crush through for seven markers from the field. At the half, Auburn was leading, 15-13.

The Curtsens came back strong in the second half and, besides continuing their air-tight defense, Gerber, Schnepf and the two Engles started a basket shooting spree which Auburn's defense was unable to stop.

As the game wore on, Coach Curtis was able to use several new men in his lineup and all ten members of the first team squad saw action.

Coach Zeke Young suffered a blow in the first part of the second half when Quance, floor guard, left the game on fouls. Hathaway, Auburn center, and Krick, Decatur backguard, also left later on personals.

It was the third straight win for the Yellow Jackets and the first loss in five starts for the Auburn quintet.

New York, Nov. 30.—(U.P.)—The close race for the championship of the Western conference this season is reflected in the "All Big Ten" football team for 1928, named today by the United Press upon the recommendation of 20 coaches of the Midwest who have watched these players in action.

Eight of the ten teams in the conference are represented on the United Press team, Minnesota, despite two defeats, placing three men on the mythical eleven.

The "All Big Ten" team for 1928 is declared by the coaches and officials who contributed their opinions to be a worthy successor to those named in the past.

Fessler of Ohio State was one of the greatest ends in the country this year, a winner of extraordinary ability who could do just about everything required and do it well. His tackling, covering of punts, and receiving of passes was said by critics to be close to perfection for line play. Hayercraft of Minnesota was unanimous choice of "Big Ten" coaches for the other wing position.

Of the year's great tackles, no matter what the section of the country, Pommerening of Michigan stood out. This powerful linesman, strong as a bull on the defense, could drop back and throw forward passes with the best of the backs when the occasion warranted.

Nowack of Illinois, chosen last year for All-America honors by a number of experts, lived up to his reputation this season and helped this team to repeat their triumph of 1927 after one of the closest races in conference history.

Gibson of Minnesota was declared by every coach and official who saw him play to be a "really great guard." Conference coaches with great guards of their own to recommend yielded the palm to the Gopher Linesman.

Wagner of Wisconsin placed at the other guard position on the United Press team, was not far behind in the general excellence of his line play.

Wagner was a tackle who combined the drive, power, and speed which could make him an ideal guard.

Randolph of Indiana was one of the greatest roving centers of the 1928 Gridiron season, a player who was all over the field, backing up the six man Houser line and covering punts with the ends.

Feddy Hovde, Minnesota quarterback, led the Big Ten individual scorers, making nine touchdowns for a total of 54 points. He was one of the best all-around backs of the year. Bennett of Indiana was a hard-hitting back who caused untold difficulty to his conference opponents with his smashing drives and twisting runs. Glasgow of Iowa would make him an ideal running mate. It was Glasgow who stepped in to prove as good a half back as there was in the Midwest towards the end of the season, after the fame of Chief Mayes McLain, the vaunted Hawkeye fullback, had dwindled somewhat.

Holmer of Northwestern, highly recommended by every conference coach, completes a backfield which would take a lot of stopping.

Only two "Big Ten" teams failed to land men on the United Press eleven. Purdue had "Pest" Welch, a great back who ranked right up with those selected, but Chicago had no one this year, the Maroons losing every conference game they played.

Other great backs of the conference were Lusby of Wisconsin, of whom Knute Rockne spoke with warm praise. Chief McLain and Cuisinier, the clever Wisconsin quarterback, one of the brainiest field generals in the Midwest. Barratt of Ohio and Conry of Wisconsin were great centers who were just nosed out by Randolph.

Led by the fine basket shooting of Coppess, forward, the Monroe Bear Cats defeat the Monroeville independent basketball team at Monroeville, last night 33-21.
