One of the most important considerations is the line that frames the face; this always follows the line of the hair and in consequence there is generally the suggestion of the eyebrow line although it is not done in any radical way. The straight-across-the-forehead line is accomplished in some cases to stimulate the hair-dress of these women who wear their hair straight back from the forehead.


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
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
