State To Lose Large Sum In Insurance Money

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 6.—(U.P.)—In an opinion given upon request of Clarence Wyson, state insurance commissioner, Attorney General Arthur L. Gilliom today made a ruling that will mean the loss of thousands of dollars of state money to certain automobile insurance companies.

The opinion points out that state departments are not permitted by law to insure with reciprocal companies where the insured would have to stand losses should the company fail.

Would Make Masking Of Highways Federal Offense

Washington, Dec. 6.—(U.P.)—A bill making it a federal offense punishable by a fine of \$5,000 and 10 years imprisonment or both, for "any two or more persons to go in disguise on public highways," was ready for introduction today by Representative L. Berger, Socialist, Wisconsin.

Commenting on the measure, Berger said: "My bill proposes to re-enact in several important particulars the acts passed in 1870 and 1871 against the Ku Klux Klan of that time."

Wednesday Coldest Dec. 5 In 55 Years

Chicago, Dec. 6.—(U.P.)—Following the coldest December 5 in 55 years, the mercury was climbing here today and was expected to be back to normal by the last of the week.

The backbone of the cold wave which swept out of the west was believed broken. A light snowfall in the Mississippi valley, ushering in the wintry snap, caused some damage to corn still standing but otherwise inflicted little loss.

FIRE PREVENTION WARNINGS ISSUED

Alfred Hogston, State Fire Marshal, issues the following fire prevention warnings for the holiday season:

Avoid inflammable decorations of any kind. This applies to Christmas trees, banquet and dance halls, school rooms etc.

Artificial snow makes a wonderful decoration—but beware it is non-inflammable. The non-inflammable snow is no more expensive, and easy to procure.

Under no circumstances permit the use of lighted candles on Christmas trees. Electric lighting fixtures may prevent a costly fire, saving lives and property.

Paper decorations are an invitation to fire. Never attach paper decorations to electric wires, fixtures or bulbs. A million dollars of automobiles were burned in St. Louis about two years ago by doing this.

Do not use lighted candles in conjunction with inflammable decorations on the table.

Make sure that Santa Claus beard and costume are of fire-proof materials; or tragedy may attend your party. Never use cotton batting for decorations of any kind. Use mineral wool, it is just as pretty, and is non-inflammable.

Neither use nor permit others to use a home motion picture machine with inflammable films. Your Christmas party may turn into a holocaust.

Smokers should throw away their cigars or cigarettes when entering a store crowded with shoppers. One careless smoker may easily be the cause of a terrible tragedy.

It is well at this time to repeat the warning that furnaces are easily overheated; that kerosene and gasoline are a prolific source of danger to life and property; and that home dry-cleaning is likely to prove an expensive way to save money.
