Refitted by Navy, She Will Test  
Devices to Save Lives  
of Sailors

New London, Conn.—If an inanimate thing of steel and brass and shining tungsten may be said to atone, then the submarine S-4 is on the way to paying society back for the 40

lives it cost a year ago on the bottom of the sea off Provincetown.

For the onetime "steel coffin" is back on the seas—dedicated to the business of saving life. She has neither engines nor motors. From the exterior she looks much as she did on Dec. 17 last when she was struck by a Coast Guard destroyer while emerging from a practice dive. But on the inside all is changed.

Refitted by the Navy as a safety laboratory, the S-4 will undertake a series of experiments here and at Key West that are confidently expected to revolutionize the science of deep sea diving.

To "pig boat" men themselves the most important of these has to do with a demonstration of the practicability of the "bad eyes," or ring bolts, that have been attached to the craft amidships, the use of which, it is predicted, will reduce the time required to raise a sunken submarine from a matter of weeks to days, perhaps hours.

On the heels of this experiment will be a tryout of the "artificial lung," a device enabling submarine crews to escape from a sunken and disabled craft. Invented by Lieutenant Charles Mommson, of the Naval Bureau of Construction and Repair, the "lung" is much like the wartime gas mask, and of even fewer parts. It is claimed that persons versed in its use can come to the surface from a considerable depth with no ill effects.

Thus will the S-4 endeavor to make scientific atonement for the frightful tragedy which trapped forty officers and men on the bottom of the sea to die of suffocation.

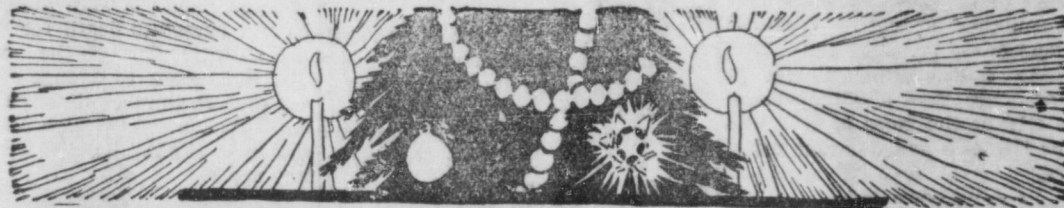
