FOUR KILLED IN

AUTO ACCIDENTS

New Years Day Accidents

Take Lives Of Four Hoosiers; Others Hurt

Indianapolis Jan. 2.—(UP)—Four lost their lives in Indiana New Years day, in automobile accidents.

Fred Dugan, brakeman for the Chicago, and Eastern Illinois railroad, was killed when he endeavored to warn the driver of an automobile of the approach of a freight train near Evansville. Dugan was crushed between the machine and the train.

George Brew, 54, Grand Rapids, Mich., was killed and six other persons injured near Fort Wayne, when their automobile overturned.

Elmer F. Warner, Elkhart, died of injuries received when his automobile crashed head-on with a street car.

Clarence Gubart, 45, was killed instantly when struck by an automobile driven by Edward P. Lion 17 of Mauhant.

Two Wills Proved

The last will and testament of Jacob Rawley has been probated in court here.
